CHAPTER VI CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

Based on the results of qualitative research that uses the documentation method with film scripts as an instrument in the research entitled Authority Relationship Revealed in the Directive Acts by The Character, the conclusions and suggestions are written as follows:

A. Conclusion

- 1. Based on the data obtained by the researcher, Mulan's directive acts are in the form of commands, requests, questions, and advises which are inversely proportional to the speech acts theory from Searle (1969). Likewise, Mulan's directive acts are inversely proportional to the previous study because they have different research directions even with the same topic. Directive acts on the request type appear 18 times with a percentage of 40% as Mulan's way of expressing her opinions and thoughts.
- 2. Based on the results of research related to authority relationships in directive acts, the characters from the film Mulan successfully reveal all types of relationships that confirm according to Joos theory. Previous research that supports this research also reveals the types of language styles that are in accordance with the theory but do not find frozen styles in their research. Of the five styles of language found, consultative and casual styles are the most dominant used in the study with the same percentage appearing 48 times.

B. Suggestion

Based on the problems in the research that have been completed, the authors write some suggestions as follows:

1. To the Teachers

The results of this study can be used for additional material that can be used for teaching which includes directive acts, and also authority relationship so that this research can be continued as the development of teachers as teachers.

2. To the Readers

The results of this study can be used as additional knowledge related to directive acts and authority relationship. It can also be used as knowledge of speech acts in social life.

3. To the next researcher

The written research process and research results can be used as a reference to support further research, especially on directive acts and authority relationship material so that in the future it can produce better research.
